



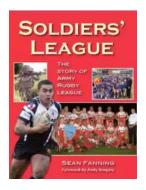

Considered one of the greatest science-fiction novels ever written, "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Seas" explores themes of culture, class, grief, and


the preservation of the environment. It is considered one of the forerunners of the ecology movement and displays a great respect for the life of the sea.


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
